Dear Christ Community,

There is a story (as told by Brennen Manning) where St. Francis and Brother Leo were walking down the road. St. Francis noticed Brother Leo's depressed mood, and asked him what it meant to be pure of heart. Brother Leo talked about having no sins or faults. St. Francis said "No wonder you sad. We will always have something to reproach ourselves for." Leo concurred. St. Francis responded, "Listen carefully to me. Don't be so preoccupied with the purity of your heart. Turn and look at Jesus. Admire him. Rejoice that he is what he is--your brother, your friend, your Lord and Savior. That, little brother, is what it means to be pure of heart. And once you've turned to Jesus, don't turn back and look at yourself. Don't wonder where you stand with him."

He goes on to talk about how this focus on oneself as being perfect can almost be idolatry, and that we should be focusing on the beauty and graciousness of Christ. Certainly the Lord demands our efforts and fidelity, but holiness is not a personal achievement. Rather it is an emptiness that cries out, God alone is the Holy One, God alone is Lord.

LAST SUNDAY

We read Matthew 1:18-26 (read it at <https://www.biblegateway.com/passage/?search=Matthew%201:18-25>). In this scripture, Mary is found to be pregnant, and as Joseph prepares to quietly break off the engagement, he experiences a dream where an angel tells him not to be afraid to take Mary as a wife, that her child is of the Holy Spirit, and this is all part of God's plan for the baby to save people from their sins. From this familiar story, we gather these timeless truths:

1. Mary and Joseph were ordinary people facing ordinary scandals, just like us, but they had amazing faith. We can look at scandals as opportunities to draw closer to God, and know that the work of God in the world is scandalous to the standards of society.
2. Joseph's clarity and resolve to move forward. Sometimes in life we just have to keep moving forward, trust our decisions and go with them. If he can welcome a

son that is not biologically his, surely we are called to that level of grace and beyond, which only is a fraction of God's.

3. Make room for miracles. When God sends you an angel, don't doubt it. You don't have to know everything all at once, but we can rely on God to help us through
